Rapid Rise of Taylor


"Less than a year ago CR. Taylor, of North, was playing in the parklands for Prospect Methodist. Now he is one of the most valued members of the North senior team. Although he entered the ranks of the red-and-whites with the reputation of being a smart centre man Taylor has been utilised in the half-forward division. He is a brilliant high mark, a useful kick, and is smart on the ground. He has registered 20 goals for North this season, and was unable to play in one engagement owing to injury. Comparing the difference between play in parkland and league teams, Taylor stated that in A Grade he had met all champion half-backs. They used more strategy. Questioned concerning his style of play, he stated that he made high marking and long dropkicking his chief objectives. Taylor, who can kick with either foot on the run, is 6 ft. tall. As he is only 20 years of age, he should go far. Tennis and swimming are his summer recreations, and at the former sport he has been prominent for his church club."



"South Australian Register"— Saturday 7 June 1890

"Several peculiar things distinguished the match between Norwood and Medindie, which took place on the Adelaide Oval on Saturday. The first was the difficulty both clubs had in securing a full complement of men. The next thing that struck the onlookers was the strange decisions of Mr. McIntyre, who seemed to be making no attempt at all to umpire successfully, and the result was that the players took advantage of him... Then, again, in the last quarter, when the game was won and lost, two Norwoods and two Medindies, without any excuse whatever, left the ground. It is making rather a farce of the game if players can leave the ground whenever they choose, and it is to be hoped that the captains will prevent any such conduct in the future."

Mishaps Follow Marriage

"The wedding bells which have rung for North Adelaide team-mates Mike Doszna and Les Myles this year have been a bad omen in one respect for both men. Soon after their marriages each received depressed fractures of the cheekbone, fortunately however, not the result of any domestic disharmony.

For Doszna his injury was sustained in the recent match against West Torrens at Football Park, while Myles was hurt in the first trial game of the year. Myles, a halfback flanker, is having his second crack at League football. In 1975 he played six games for the Roosters before returning to Port Pirie where he played with Proprietary and Solomontown Football Club."

In the North Adelaide Junior Football Association it reported Tony Mustaca (Gepps Cross) won the Under 13 Don Lindner Medal, Peter Krieg (Hope Valley) won the Under 11 Kev Curtis Medal and David Cole (Modbury) the Under 9 John Graham Medal (2nd in succession).

"The Advertiser" — Tuesday 15 September 1942

DALY v FARMER

"Talking to Mr. Jack Rees yesterday, I was interested to hear him compare the late Boss Daly with Ken Farmer, each of whom held the distinction of having kicked 23 goals in one football match. Jack thinks Farmer's feat was the better because he played against a team (West Torrens) qualified for the final four, and which included Dinnison, State goalkeeper for the season, whereas Boss's performance was against a very weak team. However, he had 24 remarkably accurate shots, which yielded 23 goals; one hit the goal post. Farmer's shots included a number of misses."

"The game up to half-time was intensely interesting. Even the free show of the elephant and camel as they marched up and down outside the machinery hall, could not attract more than a passing glance" – North vs Norwood (Rd 13, 1904)

"The Advertiser" — Monday 13 May 2007

"If the victory over Norwood was a statement for the club then this win rubber stamped the fact the Roosters are ready to take the next step in their evolution under Jarman. The trademark attacking flair will always remain a key component while Jarman is in charge. But that much-needed defensive aspect to the Roosters' game which had been lacking is seemingly being corrected."



COLTS PRACTISE


"North Colts had their first practice last night at Prospect Oval. About 50 boys, whose ages ranged from 14 to 17 years, did light work under the direction of Percy Lewis. It is expected that more than 60 boys will train with the side within the next few weeks. Two teams from the Colts' training list will be opposed in the first trial match on Saturday. They will play a curtain raiser to the senior practice game. The Colts will be on the oval at 1.15pm, and the seniors at 3 p.m.

"In the practice games this season North will provide the boundary umpires with whistles. These will do away with the signalling by hand, and it seems certain that the North move will be watched with interest by football followers.

NORTH ADELAIDE and Norwood Colts formed a guard of honor as Ken Farmer today led the North league team on to the oval for the last time. The champion goalkicker made his last appearance in league football in the Norwood match at Norwood this afternoon.



Ken Farmer, North's captain and full forward, was chaired from the field after the game against Nor-wood this afternoon—the last match of his career. The redleg skipper (Kevin Hardiman) presented Far-mer with the ball which had been

used in the game.
At half-time the Mayor of Kensington and Norwood (Mr. Martens), in the presence of club officials and members of the Prospect and Kensington and Norwood Councils, asked those present to drink a toast to the North captain.

Before the game North Colts formed a guard of honor for Farmer, who was given a rousing reception by the crowd. Farmer's seven goals today brought his total to 1,418 in 13 years.

Redlegs Win By 81 Points

ALTHOUGH conditions were against high marking and systematic football at Norwood, the redlegs achieved a wet-weather triumph, winning by 81 points over North. Ken Farmer snapped seven goals in his last game. Despite the waterlogged ball and rain squalls, the teams scored 43 goals in 64 scoring shots.
